### Ministers pledge extra cash to tackle Scotland's population challenges

MINISTERS have pledged to inject extra cash into some of Scotland's most fragile rural communities in a bid to reverse depopulation.

Cabinet Secretary Fiona Hyslop said a special task force is examining ways to protect small towns and avoid Edinburgh distorting the national picture in a similar way to London.

Advisers are also looking at using targeted advertising and a separate Scottish visa system to encourage migrants to move to struggling and remote areas.

In an interview with The Herald, Ms Hyslop said the goal was a "well-balanced population across all of Scotland".





Scotland has lower population density than the UK as a whole






## Scotland's population was the **highest ever** in 2018, and is **projected to rise**








## Some areas are growing rapidly; in others the population is falling




## Projected population change, 2016 to 2041

## Most moves are to neighbouring areas






### Most common non-British nationals living in Scotland



Life expectancy was steadily increasing, but has now fallen slightly









## Life expectancy varies across Scotland

## Key messages

### **Population**

- Population is growing fastest in the east and around the main cities
- Population is projected to fall in one third of council areas
- Age structure varies a lot across the country
- Population is ageing, everywhere

### Migration

- Most migration is to/from neighbouring areas
- Edinburgh and Glasgow have highest levels of in- and out-migration

### Births and deaths

- Birth rates are lowest in the cities
- Life expectancy varies by 5 years for women, and 7 years for men, between the highest and lowest council areas



### City of Edinburgh Council Area Profile




Between 1998 and 2018, the population of City of Edinburgh has increased by 16.2%. This is the 3rd highest percentage change out of the 32 council areas in Scotland. Over the same period, Scotland's population rose by 7.1%.




